The Houston Conchology Society held its election of officers during the noon lunch break at the annual auction, Saturday, March 19, 2022, at Immanuel Lutheran Church Hall.

President Leslie Crnkovic called the meeting to order at 12:07 p.m. Leslie thanked all for coming to the auction, and asked for a moment of remembrance for all the fellow shellers that recently passed. He then asked for approval for the February 20, 2022 meeting minutes. Russell Renka made the motion, Angela Doucette seconded, all approved.

Leslie then announced upcoming events: the HCS Banquet will be held at noon, Saturday April 23, 2022 at the Monument Inn. Tickets are available for 33 dollars apiece. HCS dues are due, and can be paid today; \$15 dollars individual, \$20 Family. The COA Convention will be held in Galveston TX from May 31st through June 4th, and there are brochures about this on the back table near checkout.

There was no other business forthcoming, so Angela Doucette made a motion to adjourn, Lucy Clampit seconded, and Leslie Crnkovic adjourned the meeting at 12:13 p.m.

COA 2022: A SPECIAL THANK YOU TO OUR TEAM

COA 2022 has come and gone, something I thought would never arrive. I approached Anne Joffe, COA Convention Representative and Board Member, back in 2018 about getting approval to hold a convention in Texas. When I was President of COA in 1997, I had asked Anne if she would host a convention on either Captiva or Sanibel Island while I was in office. So, my seeking approval was actually payback from me. Anne thought it was a wonderful idea and agreed to discuss my request with COA President Harry Lee. The voting members of the Board thought it was an excellent idea also and approval was granted.

Having been in senior management in large corporations most of my professional career, I knew my first and probably the most important task was to choose and develop a team of people to support the effort needed to put the convention in motion. I starting contacting potential candidates immediately and had a wonderful team together within two weeks. Next came the task of selecting the venue to hold this convention. My first, and really the only one I wanted,

was Moody Gardens Hotel and Spa on Galveston Island. Linda and I met with the Director of Sales and hammered out a contract that both parties could live with. I contacted Anne and gave her the name of the venue and the proposed dates. She ran this information by President Lee and the Board and they thought it was perfect. The date was set for May 31-June 4, 2021. Then COVID-19 hit the country and forced COA to cancel the upcoming convention in Melbourne and we had to move our dates out another year. I spent almost three complete years developing and planning this convention. Thanks to a terrific team of people, the convention started to take form and we rescheduled for 2022.

As most members of the Texas shell clubs and many members of COA are aware, I was diagnosed with cancer in late December 2021: Non-Hodgins Lymphoma in Stage 3. I started chemotherapy treatments in early January. I was not able to eat during the process. I just couldn't force any food into my stomach, so I lived on liquids from January to May. By early March, I had lost nearly 50 pounds and it was continuing to drop, not to mention that I felt terrible much of the time. By mid-March, my ability to work on the convention was more than I could handle. With only three months to go before the convention, I had to make a major change in my team to ensure we were ready. I decided to contact Wanda Coker and ask her to take over as Convention Chairman, replacing me. Wanda quickly agreed to accept my offer and told me that she and Patty Humbird had my back and they completely understood my situation and my deteriorating condition. So, the change in leadership was completed in mid-stream and Wanda took over and led us through the convention.

The real purpose of this article is the say "A SPECIAL THANK YOU TO WANDA COKER AND THE ENTIRE TEAM". I could not have done it without all of you that were so generous to help and to my replacement, Wanda Coker. She jumped right in and started making decisions and leading the entire team. Most of the readers of this article are probably not aware of what a difficult position she had walked into, but Wanda did and she accepted it with grace and a high level of energy, not to mention all the great ideas she brought to the table. It was Wanda driving the train into the station and she did it on time and on



budget. Wanda was an absolute pleasure to work with during these last three months. I was so amazed just how much our thought process was so similar and on target with each other.

WANDA... you made it happen, and everyone who attended loved the convention, how it was organized, and the events that were planned. I am so proud to have been in your corner and supporting you in this absolutely terrific effort. You did it with little or no knowledge of what I had planned or expected. I think the highlight of the convention for me was the Awards Banquet where we publicly recognized each of the team members and thanked them for a job well done. That was a PROUD moment in my life and it was all due to the leadership and determination of our leader, Wanda Coker. Wanda... I salute you for all you did in Galveston at Moody Gardens. You are my HERO and I take great pride in calling you MY FRIEND and saying "A SPECIAL THANK YOU". Congratulations on a job well done. You were thrown into the river and you swam to the other side and told us to follow. That is a leader. We love you and appreciate you.

Everything from dozens of colored *Homalocatha pele*... to any color Spondylus you could ask for... to obscure brachiopods... to Golden Cowries by the dozen... to replica *Homalocantha anomalaie*... to 5 or 6 different species of *Scaphella* shells... any cone shell, any cowry your heart could desire seemed to be in Bourse and each and every one was calling my name.

But my absolute favorite thing was getting to meet people face to face. People we had only known from the internet, new people we were just meeting for the first time, and the amazing people who put on the convention – it's the people that made going to the convention magical.

We added some amazing, rare specimen shells to our collection and between the Bourse, the silent auction, and the books sales we added 50 books and magazines to our library. But what we will remember most will be the people we met, the new friends we made.



Next convention, I need to make more of an effort to take pictures. I think I will take photos of the shell dealers each time I buy from them. And, I wish I had taken photos of the speakers. Lisa Alderman: COA Convention Door Prize Solves Mystery

Last December I took a day trip over to Sea Rim State Park and found two fossil shells of a type I'd never found on that beach before. I went through my limited library and couldn't seem to find a match. I brought them to the next Shell Club meeting to see if anyone had an idea and the consensus was "apple murex". I have apple murex from Sanibel and didn't think that was the answer. Besides, I'd never found apple murex at Sea Rim in all the years I'd been going there. So, I put them in a plastic box on the shelf to investigate later.

Fast forward to the COA Convention. After a fun-filled, interesting and entertaining time at Moody Gardens and the Convention, I spent an afternoon going through the treasures I had collected there. From the first Silent Auction, a couple of pretty Spondylidae *spondylus*. Not the ones I was originally after, but the ones I was standing closest to as the auction was ending. These auctions are a competitive sport! If you find something you really want, you need to stake out the area and have pen ready in case you need to make a last-minute bid.

Then there were the purchases from the Dealer Bourse. I'll admit, I spent more than I was planning to spend (I'm sure I'm not the only one!). The sight of all those beautiful shells was amazing and so tempting! I did manage to stay focused on the Families (Patellidae and Fissurellidae) that are of interest to me. Fortunately for me, John Haneiko was aware of a nice Fissurella costata in Phil Clover's booth and the first purchase was made. Wandering around the room I found a few others and a chance encounter with Wanda Coker sent me over to check the Sea Shell Searchers Club's table. Thanks to Wanda and Patty Humbird who sorted through the bags and found the one containing "Patellidae" shells for me. The look on John's face when I showed him the huge Patella tabularis it contained was priceless!

But, back to the mystery fossil shells. The last I sorted through were the two door prize bags.

Contained in these bags were a variety of beautiful shells collected on the Texas Gulf Coast in the 1980s and 1990s. And there it was, *Murex fulvescens* collected November 5, 1994 at Port Aransas. The mystery was solved! (Thank you, Dave Green!) I went back through my Sea Rim shells and found a small fragment that appears to be this shell, but otherwise nothing resembling that shell.

Shelling – be it at the beach, Dealer Bourse or COA Convention Door Prize, you never know what treasure you might find!
