Beach Report: Sea Rim State Park – October 2, 2023

I always check the time of the low tide at Sea Rim before making that 110-mile journey. When I arrived on the morning of October 2, I had a moment of panic when the Ranger told me that the East Beach was closed due to an extreme high tide the night before. If you go to hunt for shells at Sea Rim, you know the East Beach is where you want to be, not the West Beach. If it was closed, this was going to be a wasted trip. What she meant was that the East Beach was closed to cars. Whew, no problem! I don't drive on the beach.

Walking out onto the beach, I was amazed to see that the beach was essentially washed clean except for a narrow trash line up where the rubbish bins are lined up. Yes, the tide had reached the line of rubbish bins. In my mind I knew it had to happen occasionally as there are shells that high on the beach but looking at the width of the beach it was hard to imagine.



There were very few shark eye, very few angel wings, very few of anything. Instead of filling my bucket with shells, I was picking up rubbish and dumping it in the bins. But, I kept walking thinking that an extreme high tide had surely brought in something big. And it did! About 2 miles down the beach I found the nicest, largest (169.7mm) whelk shell I've ever found on that beach! You just never know what treasures await, one more step down the beach.

New Snail Named After Jimmy Buffet's Song!

Very fittingly, a new marine snail was named this week after Jimmy Buffet's best-known song, Margaritaville. Cayo margarita is a new species of worm snail from the Florida Keys reported by Rüdiger Bieler and collaborators that made the national news, including a nice article on CNN "Space + Science" online news. The bright lemon-yellow color of the snail's "skin" provided the initial inspiration for the scientific name of the species. (And the genus name *Cavo*—low island, or key, in Spanish—honors the localities where the species were originally found.) Cayo margarita lives attached to pieces and blocks of dead corals and catches its prev using a mucus net that ensnares zooplankton. Read the original scientific report here.

The very first stamp to show a fossil was issued by Algeria in 1952 for the 19th Geologic Convention held in that country. The stamp depicts the middle Jurassic ammonite *Berbericeras sekikense* Roman, 1933 from the Lower Bathonian, Zigzag Zone, Gebel Sekika, Algeria.
